

This year we decided to increase the frequency of the Newsletter from two issues to three issues, with a view to possibly increasing to four issues in the future should there be a call. It means on the positive side that news is more current and there is room for more news; on the less positive side it means that deadlines come round even faster. The result this time is a considerably slimmer newsletter, but one which contains very up to date news. It is clear that pressures in all countries on academic colleagues to publish in journals makes the newsletter a lesser priority, and with competing demands on limited time, some colleagues are finding difficulty in producing reports. We need to evaluate how frequently our Association needs or wants a Newsletter and this issue will be discussed by the Executive Committee in Stockholm in July. Another issue which needs to be evaluated is electronic versus paper newsletter; at present there are no plans to lose the paper version, though this is already transmitted on-line. Members views on both these points are welcome. My personal view is that an Association such as ours should publish both a journal and a regular newsletter, the latter for the exchange of all kinds of news, information, views and debate, also good practice across our many members and their countries.

Also at the Executive Committee meeting in Stockholm we will be discussing the issue of recruitment and membership. A glance at the current membership list reveals a fact which may be obvious, but which surely cannot be logical: namely that members are very unevenly spread across the world, and some countries have no members while others have surprisingly large membership of the Association. Almost half the paid-up membership is from the USA, with next largest group being United Kingdom, followed by Australia, Italy and Japan. These numbers may reflect particularly active recruitment drives, or past Congresses (for example Kyoto). Europe's 'top scorers' aside from Italy and UK, are Germany, Spain, France, Netherlands, Sweden. There are still relatively small numbers from the African continent, from the Middle and Far East, and also South America. Seventy-five different countries are represented on our members' database. I will do a more detailed and systematic analysis of membership figures by region and country for the next newsletter and also an update by Division membership. We maintain the Action 100 category of members who receive membership privileges gratis for a fixed period of time, and will be evaluating this initiative asking for reports from existing Action 100 members, with a view to offering this benefit to a new group of 100 from low GNP countries. The somewhat complicated fee structure of our Association will be under discussion at the Executive Council, and there may be a way of simplifying the fee structure while retaining the important differentials that make membership of the Association possible for as many colleagues as possible.

I would urge all members of the Association to do their bit to recruit new members. The personal contact and recommendation is the most powerful means of recruitment, and as the oldest international association of psychology in the world we should surely make sure that we have

of psychology in the world we should surely make sure that we have members in all countries and that they are not lonely ones and twos but are able to participate in activity both nationally and internationally. Please continue to contribute news and views to the Newsletter, and any feedback or suggestions for its improvement would be very gratefully received.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear IAAP Colleagues:

During the past five years, your IAAP officers have met on a regular basis with the officers of the International Union of Psychological Science (IUPsyS) to work together on projects to enhance international psychology. Our most recent meeting was held on April 14-15 in Bruges, Belgium, hosted by Professor Géry d'Ydewalle of the University of Leuven, President of the IUPsyS. We worked on policy issues in regard to our joint support of Regional Congresses, and agreed that the primary goal of these Congresses should be to enhance psychology in developing regions by: Disseminating knowledge based on advances in scientific research and professional practice; strengthening psychological associations in the host region; and stimulating the education and training of psychologists (capacity-building).

At our meeting in Bruges, we also tentatively agreed to support a proposal received from leaders of psychology in Bombay, India for convening a Regional Congress in December 2001. This will be the fourth biannual Regional Congress supported by the IAAP and the IUPsyS. The International Association of Cross-Cultural Psychology will also be invited to co-sponsor this Congress as they have the three previous Regional Congresses, which were convened in China in 1995, Mexico in 1997, and South Africa in 1999. All of these Congresses were held in July at times that did not compete with the Congresses of the European Federation (EFPPA), or with the Inter-American Society (SIP).

Given the heat and the monsoons, it would not be desirable to hold a Regional Congress in India during the summer, but Bombay has ideal weather in December when most of us must endure unpleasant winter climates. Convening the Congress on December 17-20 will also fall nicely at the end of the fall term for academicians, while giving all participants an opportunity to return home before Christmas. Although primarily for

opportunity to return home before Christmas. Although primarily for colleagues who reside in the region, the Congress in Bombay will give those of us who have never visited India an opportunity to do so. For those who would like to see more of India, the Congress organizers are working with travel agents to arrange pre-and/or post-Congress tours to Delhi, and to Agra for visiting the Taj Mahal.

We have encountered a number of bumps in the transition from our previous publisher to Blackwells. However, I am pleased to report that most of these problems have been or will soon be resolved. There was confusion in the billing of dues for membership renewal in that the subscription to our journal was emphasized, rather than the continuation of membership. U.S. residents were also billed in UK pounds, rather than in dollars as they were billed in the past. I would like to express my appreciation to Secretary-General Jose Prieto and Newsletter Editor Ingrid Lunt for the time and energy that they have invested in working with Blackwells to correct these problems.

Blackwells has developed a beautiful membership application brochure that provides detailed information about the IAAP, and "six good reasons" for colleagues to join. Detailed information about our journal, *Applied Psychology: An International Review*, is also provided in the brochure which includes the names and institutional affiliations of all members of the Editorial Board. We are planning to include the Application Form with a future issue of *Applied Psychology* or the IAAP Newsletter, and would like to encourage each member of the IAAP to recruit at least one new member during the current year. The benefit of membership provides an attractive and challenging opportunity for colleagues to become involved in international psychology in this information age in which the world grows steadily smaller as distances are reduced and communication is facilitated by the internet.

Plans for an outstanding International Congress of Applied Psychology (ICAP), to be held in Singapore in July 2002, are being developed by Dr. Elizabeth Nair and her colleagues. Program Chairs for each of our 14 Divisions have been appointed to the Scientific Program Committee. The Divisions will be given greater responsibility for selecting invited speakers and invited symposia, and for evaluating submissions that fall within the general areas of their expertise. Dr. Nair has informed me that the Call for program contributions will be available in time for distribution in July at the International Congress of Psychology in Stockholm, and will be sent to all IAAP members shortly thereafter.

It was my pleasure to participate in the first Asian-Pacific Congress of Psychology, which was organized by Dr. Nair in 1993, and more recently to take part in the IAAP Site Visit that selected Singapore for our Congress in 2002. The Singapore Convention Center is arguably the best in the world, surrounded by beautiful 5-star hotels, with attractive and comfortable facilities located nearby for students and colleagues with limited budgets. Singapore also has one of the worlds' finest airports, with

SPECIAL ISSUE ON ORGANIZATIONAL PSYCHOLOGY

Revista de Psicología General y Aplicada. (1999) volume 52, 2-3.

The Spanish Journal of General and Applied Psychology published by the Spanish Federation of Psychology Associations, has recently published a special issue on Organizational Psychology edited by José M. Peiró and Pilar Ripoll (University of Valencia) This issue offers a state of the art of research on organizational psychology in Spain. It starts with an introductory article on recent changes, challenges and perspectives of organizational psychology (Peiró, J.M. and Ripoll, P). Several contributions focus on research on teams in organizations: Influences of new forms of organizational flexibility on work-teams (Alcover, C. and Gil, F.); Work-team building, conflict management behaviors and culture change in organizations (Ayestarán, S.) and Meaning of Organizational Safety in the context of work-teams (Cabrera, D., Rolo, G., Gil-Monte, P. and Suarez, E.).

Another set of articles deals with mediation and negotiation. They include the article by G. Serrano and M. Mendez on Mediators interventions and the one coauthored by Cruces, S.J., Cisneros, I., Munduate, L. Gomedz, T and Dorado, M.A., on Cultural and Socioemotional factors in the negotiation processes: The importance of lying.

A third set of articles focus on Climate and culture in organizations. They include the paper by Gonzalez-Roma, V. and Peiró, J.M. on Climate in Work Organizations and Teams. And the one by Sanchez, J.C., Alonso, E. And Palaci, F.J. on Organizational culture concept, theoretical bases and recent research in Spain.

Organizational assessment and intervention research is also represented by the articles of Quijano, S. and Navarro, J. The ASH (Human Sistem Audit) quality models and organizational assessment, and the one by Salanova, M. and Grau, R. Training Need Analysis and training evaluation in technological change contexts.

The special issue ends with two more articles one on Ethical dimensions of the organization by A. Rodriguez and V. Zarco and the other on Work and Organizational Psychology in Spain: A review of the state of the art in the nineties. This article offers a very detailed view of the research carried out in Spain on work and organizational Psychology during the nineties and this contributions are related to the societal and economic changes occurred in Spain during this decade.

This special issue offers a comprehensive and updated perspective about recent developments of Work and Organizational Psychology in Spain and show how this discipline is growing and making relevant contributions.

SPECIAL ISSUE ON PSYCHOSOCIAL FACTORS OF RISK PREVENTION AND HEALTH PROMOTION AT WORK. AN INTERNATIONAL PERSPECTIVE.

Revista de Psicología del Trabajo y de las Organizaciones (1999), 15, 2.

The Spanish Journal of Work and Organizational Psychology, published by the Colegio Oficial de Psicólogos has published a Special Issue on Psychosocial factors of risk prevention and Health promotion at work: an international perspective. It has been edited by José M. Peiró and María Jesús Bravo (University of Valencia)

After the promulgation of the Spanish Law on Risk prevention based on the European Directive on the same issue, an increasing demand is emerging to carry out job risk analysis and interventions for preventing risks. The law explicitly states that psychosocial factors have to be taken into account, and this situation represents a challenge and an opportunity for Work and Organizational Psychologists. In this context, further developments are required from researchers and professionals that should contribute with theoretical models, methodologies and diagnosis and intervention practices. This special issue intends to offer an overview of the developments that took place recently in different countries on these issues aiming to stimulate benchmarking and exchange of ideas and best practices.

The issue has an introductory chapter that analysis the current Spanish situation in the field of psychosocial factors of risk prevention research and practices. The implications of the new law are formulated and the challenges for research, training and professional practices are considered.

Peiró, J.M. and Bravo, M.J. (Spain): Psychosocial factors of work risk prevention: Challenges and Opportunities for work and Organizational Psychology.

Peiró, J.M. (Spain). Psychosocial risk evaluation at work and prevention strategies: The AMIGO model as a theoretical foundation of the methodology: "Prevenlab/Psychosocial".

YOUTH RESEARCH PROJECT: YOUTH TRANSITIONS INTO LABOUR MARKET AND WORK. A LONGITUDINAL STUDY FROM AN ECONOMICAL AND PSYCHOSOCIAL PERSPECTIVE.

A joint research project has been carried out by the Instituto Valenciano de Investigaciones Economicas and the Research Unit of Organizational and Work Psychology of the University of Valencia being sponsored by the Foundation of Bancaja (A saving bank of the region of Valencia).

This project aims to study the processes through which young people enter into the labor market and into work and consolidate their work role, and how these processes are influenced by socioeconomic situation. The project is based on human capital theory models and also in psychosocial interactionist models of work-role development. Thus, macro and micro environmental factors are taken into consideration as well as personal characteristics of the youngsters (qualification and formation, values, attitudes and interests). In addition, behaviors of young people in the labour market (job search, job acceptance and voluntary/ involuntary job withdrawal) and in the work place (content innovation, career enhancing strategies, etc) are considered as an important antecedent of work role consolidation, career development and success in the transition process.

The study has been designed as a longitudinal one with two waves (1996 and 1999) and with a representative sample (2000 youngsters between 16 and 30 years old) of the Valencian Region. 950 people have answered the interview/questionnaire in both waves.

A retrospective interview was included in the questionnaire for those that during the last five years (since 1991) first entered into the labor market searching for jobs whether they found them or not. Information about the jobs held, salaries, etc. and the type of companies that employed has been gathered. The same information was obtained retrospectively in the second wave (1999) from 1996.

Recently the final report of the second wave study has been delivered to the sponsors. The first one has been published as a book (García-Montalvo, Palafox, Peiró and Prieto, 1997). Longitudinal results show rather interestingly that a rather large array of psychological variables (work valued outcomes, work behavior, work attitudes, satisfaction, preferences for flexibility of jobs, decisions, more or less emphasis on personal initiative, etc.) are different depending on economical changes

and of the socioeconomic situation. In fact, 1996 was a period of recession in Spanish economy while 1999 presented an expansive situation. Also, the patterns of career (sequence of jobs strategies in specific combinations of training, job acceptance and job withdrawal...) show relevant differences between both periods studied.

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DIVISION 2: PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION



Dr. Norbert Tanzer, from the University of Graz in Austria, and Secretary of Division 2, has accepted the invitation from the International Test Commission to serve as the first editor of their new journal, *International Journal of Testing*. The journal will be published by Sage, and the first issue is expected in March of 2001. As I expect many readers of the IAAP Newsletter will be interested in the journal, I have included a statement below of the editorial scope of the journal.

The journal is dedicated to the advancement of theory, research, and practice in the area of testing and assessment in psychology, education, counseling, human resource management, and related disciplines. The journal expects to publish original articles addressing theoretical issues, methodological approaches, and empirical research as well as integrative and interdisciplinary reviews of testing-related topics and reports of current testing practices. Examples of topics appropriate for the journal include: (a) new perspectives in test development and validation; (b) issues concerning the qualification and training of test users and test developers; (c) recent trends in testing and measurement arising in a particular field or discipline; (d) comparisons of national/regional differences in test practices; (e) methods and procedures in adapting tests for use in new languages or cultural groups; (f) international assessment projects or other international studies in which testing constitutes an essential element; (g) testing in culturally and/or linguistically heterogeneous populations; and (h) internationalization of testing (e.g., personnel selection for global organizations, internet applications, and

international copyrights of tests and test adaptations).

Dr. Tanzer is moving to the United States very soon and so for the next few months, information about the journal can be obtained by writing to Dr. Tanzer, c/o Catherine Sim, at simc@t-bird.edu. Dr. Tanzer suggests that you send ideas for papers and special issues to him at Catherine's address, or submit five copies of any manuscript for review to Dr. Catherine Q. E. Sim, Thunderbird-The American Graduate School of International Management, Department of International Studies, 15249 N. 59th Ave., Glendale, AZ 85308 USA. The first two issues of the journal will focus on methods for adapting educational and psychological tests, and test user qualifications.

Book Notes

New release: Wapner, S., Demick, J., Yamamoto, T., & Minami, H. (2000). *Theoretical perspectives in environment-behavior research: Underlying assumptions, research problems, and methodologies*. New York: Kluwer Academic/Plenum Publishers.

The recent book edited by Clare Cooper Marcus and Marni Barnes - *Healing gardens: Therapeutic benefits and design recommendations* (Wiley, 1999) - has won the PLACES (EDRA) award for research.

Recent Doctoral Dissertations

In June this year, two doctoral dissertations will appear at the Department of Psychology, University of Groningen, The Netherlands. Wander Jager's "Modelling consumer behaviour" reports on the development of an integrative conceptual model of consumer behaviour and a series of computer simulation experiments about the utilisation and depletion of common resources. Birgitta Gatersleben's "Sustainable household consumption and quality of life" presents an extensive analysis of household consumption growth in relation to quality of life and reports on three large-scale field studies about ownership and use of consumer goods, perceived environmental impacts and possibilities of behaviour change for sustainable development.

Conference Notes

With financial support from the European Science Foundation a British-Swedish team (Anders Biel, Claudia Carter and Clive Spash) has recently conducted two successive workshops on 'Social Psychology and Economics in Environmental Research' (SPEER). The goal of the SPEER project is to confront psychological and economics researchers over the analysis and management of environmental problems. At both workshops five themes were addressed: (1) behaviour, attitudes and preferences, (2) context: social identity, institutions and norms, (3) society/community decision-making, (4) policy regulation, and (5) social dilemmas. The organizers are now preparing a policy-makers' summary of this ESF-project as well as a volume of edited papers. Discussions so far have been lively, informative and stimulating of future collaboration between psychologists and economists. A third SPEER meeting to take place early in 2001 is being considered.

For the 27th International Congress of Psychology on July 23-28th in Stockholm this year, a 'Dag Hammarskjöld Memorial Seminar' is being organised by Tommy Gärling and others. It comprises six two-hour symposia on the general topic of 'diplomacy and psychology.' One of these symposia is devoted to international environmental policy making and features papers on environmental risk communication (Hans Spada), marketing of environmental policy (Andrzej Falkowski), environmental policy challenges in developing countries (Patricia Romero-Lankao) and ecological psychology for human security (Deborah Du Nann Winter). The symposium will be introduced and chaired by Charles Vlek (Groningen); discussants will be Mirilia Bonnes (Rome) and a Swedish environmental policy diplomat. The other five DHM symposia deal with decision-making and interdependence; social conflict, mediation and social justice; intergroup conflict; political leadership; and intercultural processes, respectively. A special issue of the *International Journal of*

processes, respectively. A special issue of the International Journal of Psychology (April 2000) contains preparatory review papers setting the stage for the DHM seminar in July.
